What is neutering?

It is a surgical procedure to remove an animal's reproductive organs to prevent it from producing offsprings.

Males are castrated and females are spayed.

When to neuter?

Cats and dogs can reproduce as early as 6 months of age. Neutering can safely be done by then.

We ask that you bring your pet in to us, in the morning with no breakfast. They will be anaesthetized, so they won't feel any pain during the procedure. Once recovered from the anaesthetic, they can go home that evening.

What happens if I don't neuter my pets?

Consider the following scenario:

Ask yourself this,

Do you have the means to care for them or to find them homes?

It is a known fact that there are a lot of stray cats and dogs wandering all around the streets. The majority of them cannot get sufficient food and are exposed to diseases and to the taunting and cruelty of heartless folks, and may end up maimed or dead from accidents.

Other Benefits

Reduce or Eliminate:

- Constant crying, yowling, restlessness and bleeding cycles (in dogs) when on heat.
- Foul odour from urine sprayings as a way of marking territory.
- Wandering and roaming in the streets in search of mates – only to come home being sick, carriers of diseases, victims of animal fights / bites and victims of road accidents.
- Aggression.
- Risk of tumors or cancers (testicular cancer in males and mammary tumors in females).
- Risk of uterine infections (pyometra in females).
